# 77% OF CURRENT IOWA SCHOOL PARENTS support

the creation of a universal Education Savings Account program.

Iowa does not currently have an Education Savings Account program to provide more school choice options for parents. Iowans are ready for it!



# 43% OF CURRENT AND FORMER IOWA SCHOOL

**PARENTS** said they would prefer to send their children to private school if financial costs and transportation were of no concern.

Currently, only 8 percent of Iowa K-12 students are enrolled in a private school. Parents want options and school choice can provide them!



## 66% OF IOWANS support

increasing the cap on tax-credit scholarships.

lowa's Student Tuition Organization Tax Credit Program has long been a bi-partisan supported program saving taxpayer dollars and offering choices to low-income students across the state.

### IOWANS SEVERELY UNDERESTIMATE SPENDING ON STUDENTS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

**50 PERCENT OF IOWANS** believe the spending amounts to \$5,000 or less per student, per year. **Far less than the actual amount of \$11,724** per student, per year.

Of all surveyed – **89%** of respondents underestimated spending on students in public schools.

### ISSUE EDUCATION MATTERS

Many school choice issues are consumed by misinformation or a lack of understanding of their many benefits to lowans. These findings show that lowans who learn more about the issues – support the issues.



Many respondents said they had never heard of Education Scholarship Accounts. Once provided with a definition – 67% OF IOWANS supported them. After respondents learned about the issue, support increased by 24%!



Many respondents said they had never heard of tax-credit scholarships. Once provided with a definition – 68% OF IOWANS supported them. After respondents learned about the issue, support increased by 32%!



# **Iowa K-12 Education Funding**

lowa K-12 public education is funded through local, state and federal sources.

In Fiscal Year 2020, the following amounts went to Iowa K-12 public education, which served 487,652 students:







\$1.5 billion in property taxes.

**\$3.228 billion** in funding provided from the state General Fund.

\$617.6 million in federal funding.

The following is the average spent from local and state sources on each public school student, per year:



\$3,204 in property tax per pupil.



**\$6,620** in state funding per pupil.

When federal funding is added in, an average of \$11,844 is spent on each student in K-12 public schools each year.

Property tax funding is not solely based on the number of students enrolled, and most federal funding is not based on student enrollment numbers. If a student transfers out of a public school, there is limited impact on the amount of property tax and federal funds flowing to that school.

# How much does the state of lowa spend on nonpublic school students?

In Fiscal Year 2020, the state spent \$265 per nonpublic school student for textbook services and transportation of students.

There were 33,365 students enrolled in lowa's accredited, nonpublic schools during Fiscal Year 2020. What if we spent \$11,844 on each of those students instead of \$265? That would amount to over \$395 million per year.
